Before the Moon Shattered and Shone Again – Deirdre Gribbin For String Quartet (2021)

"To the Celts, time was circular rather than linear. This is reflected in their commencing each day, and each festival, at dusk rather than dawn. In Irish mythology, Elathan was a prince associated with stories depicting him arriving at night by sea on a silver boat. suggesting he was their moon god. The preoccupation with the nighttime was also reflected in their year, beginning with the festival of Samhain in October when nature appears to be dying down. Tellingly, the first month of the Celtic year is Samonios, 'Seed Fall': in other words, from death and darkness springs life and light. The earliest-known Celtic calendar is the Coligny calendar, now in the Palais des Arts in Lyon, France, It is thought to date from the 1st century BC and is made up of bronze fragments, once a single huge plate. It is inscribed with Latin characters but in Gaulish. It begins each month with the full moon. During this period of extreme disruption due to the pandemic, nature has remained. The moon is a beacon constant and reassuring. Fragments of music are reinterpreted and woven via muted passages between foreground and background, with sound ebbing and flowing, transforming through chromatic coldness and then resting. The moon in this string quartet symbolises life waxing, waning, renewing and redefining." - Deirdre Gribbin

"EARTHRISE draws inspiration from the more exquisite imagery of our planet, which showcases how nature thrives most when allowed to follow its own natural course - this is where the Earth's ascent occurs. The vivid imagery finds its way back into the music through its evocative title.

Just as our planet's diverse life forms are continuously evolving to coexist in perfect synergy, independent rhythmic patterns of varying characteristics are designed for cooperative interplay.

With a vibrant melodic palette, the concerto showcases the viola's distinctively soulful resonance and remarkable versatility, embodying the role of the wandering observer, actively participating in the world it inhabits." – Liam Bates

Her Charms Invited String Quartet No.12 (2010) – Ian Wilson

"Her Charms Invited is inspired by, and based upon, various types of musical ornamentation and gesture used in sean-nòs (traditional Irish) singing, here recontextualized through the use of a contemporary musical language.

This is the third in a series of works exploring this area, following on from Where The Moorcocks Crow for alto saxophone and saxophone quartet, and The Linnet Sings Her Note So Pleasing for quartertone bass flute and live electronics. These three pieces are also linked by their use - however distantly or fragmentarily - of an original melody I wrote to the old Irish song The Mountain Streams; traces of its melodic and harmonic shape echo throughout Her Charms Invited." – Ian Wilson

Fiol for String Trio (2008) – Linda Buckley

Ioana Petcu Colan, violin; Beth McNinch, viola; Katie Tertell, cello

"The soundworld of this piece was inspired by the Norwegian Hardanger fiddle (hardingfele). 'Fiol' was the predominant term used for 'fiddle' in Danish and Norwegian of the 17th and 18th centuries. This instrument is mainly used for the performance of Norwegian folk music and is similar in construction to the violin, but with eight or nine strings. Four of the strings are strung and played like a violin, and the remaining strings, called 'sympathetic strings', resonate 'in sympathy' with the other four. Here I was interested in treating the trio as a single twelve-stringed 'meta-instrument' rather than as three separate voices, almost like a hardingfele or Baroque viola d'amore with sympathetic resonating strings" – Linda Buckley

"Physicists, who know things, tell us that it is very, very quiet in space - space, being an almost perfect vacuum, is not well equipped for transmitting sound. Residency on planet Earth offers the astonishing and magical luxury of sound.

Contemplating the vast quietude of space, I thought of Mr Shah, a Welsh astrophotographer who - at the more dedicated end of the space-curious spectrum - spends his evenings exploring space through a telescope in his garden shed.

Through his window to the universe, he has created photographs of star clusters, light years from earth, rivalling images taken from the £2.5 billion Hubble telescope.

Formed by violist Beth McNinch in 2012, Musici Ireland began as a chamber collective, bringing together some of Ireland's most celebrated musicians. Beth McNinch, viola

Beth McNinch is an acclaimed Irish violist and artistic director, known for her significant contributions to the world of classical and contemporary music. With a career that spans orchestral, chamber, and interdisciplinary work, Beth has established herself as a versatile and innovative artist, committed to musical excellence and creative exploration.

Beth's musical journey began in London, where she studied viola at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama and the Royal Academy of Music. Her abilities quickly earned recognition, leading to performances with some of the UK's leading orchestras, including the London Symphony Orchestra, City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra, and the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra. As a principal violist, Beth appeared with the Irish National Opera, Wexford Festival Opera Orchestra, English National Ballet, Ulster Symphony Orchestra, and the National Symphony Orchestra of Ireland.

Her deep understanding of programming and performance has made Beth a soughtafter artistic director. As the founder and driving force behind Musici Ireland, a celebrated chamber ensemble, she has developed a reputation for curating performances that blend beloved classical works with lesser-known pieces, creating fresh and engaging

experiences for audiences. Under her leadership, Musici Ireland has garnered international acclaim for its innovative approach to chamber music and its focus on socially relevant and interdisciplinary projects.

Throughout her career, Beth has been drawn to collaboration and experimentation, working with artists from diverse disciplines. Her passion for blending music with other art forms has led to numerous cross-genre



projects, where she seamlessly integrates music with dance, theatre, and visual arts. This interdisciplinary approach has led to bold, thought-provoking performances that challenge the boundaries of traditional concert experiences, resulting in invitations to deliver workshops, masterclasses, and lectures on the subject.

In addition to her work with Musici Ireland, Beth is a dedicated chamber musician, frequently collaborating with renowned ensembles and musicians. Her enthusiasm for exploring fresh ideas and creative approaches in performance has earned her respect and recognition within the broader music community, both in Ireland and internationally.

Deirdre Gribbins, composer

Belfast born composer Deirdre Gribbin's music has been described in The London Times as "...astonishingly accomplished, pure magic and so powerfully expressive that it communicates its meaning instantly." She has received numerous Awards and Fellowships including Huddersfield Composition Prize, The Arts Foundation Award for her Aldeburgh commissioned opera Hey Persephone! The Chester Fulbright Fellowship, and the UNESCO Composition Prize. Unity of Being was performed in New York by The

Ulster Orchestra after 9/11. Her music profiled in The New York Sunday Times. Her work has been performed by the BBC Symphony, The Philharmonia, Northern Sinfonia, Danish Radio Orchestra, National Symphony Orchestra of Ireland, Crash Ensemble, and The Ulster Orchestra and RTE orchestra. Her song cycle *Kindersang* was performed in 2023 in London, Paris and at Lincoln Center, New York and *The Stones of Life* with text by her son poet Ethan Stein who has Down Syndrome was performed by Sharon Carty and the ICO in Limerick and Dublin.



Deirdre has collaborated with astrophysicist Priya Natarajan creating the string quartet Dark Matter Hunting which was premiered by The Pacifica and Doric quartets. She has written works exploring genetics and music with scientist Sarah Teichmann and artist Esther Teichmann. Hearing Your Genes Evolve featured in the Berlinale Film Festival Documentary Prize category. Deirdre has written extensively for radio, including music for BBC Drama Embers starring Patrick Stewart and The Possessed starring Benedict Cumberbatch. She wrote the score for feature film My Kingdom starring Richard Harris which was nominated for a Screen International Award and the score for Margo Harkin's poignant documentary Stolen about Ireland's Mother and Baby Homes scandal which has screened at DocHouse London, Chicago Film Festival and Montreal Film Festival.

Her work has been recorded for NMC and Crash Ensemble labels. Deirdre is Artistic Director of *Venus Blazing Music Theatre Trust* working with people with learning disabilities.

Liam Bates, composer

Liam Bates is an award winning composer, arranger and conductor of contemporary concert music, of music for ballet and contemporary dance, of music for film and television and of musical theatre. Concert works include, Vivo, Dolmen, Elegy, Urban Monday, Dancing with Gioconda and choral works such as Angel, I Am Your Hands and the newly released Blazing Sky.



As an arranger, orchestrator and conductor, Liam has performed and recorded with many artists including Luciano Pavarotti, Pete Townsend, Bon Jovi, Meat Loaf, Bryan Adams, Dave Stewart, Michael Kamen and Elliot Goldenthal.

Liam studied composition with Giles Swayne, Susan Bradshaw and John McCabe. He studied conducting with Norman Del Mar and Albert Rosen.

Ian Wilson, composer

lan Wilson (Northern Ireland, 1964) has composed over 250 works including operas, a range of orchestral and chamber music, and multimedia pieces. His compositions have been performed and broadcast on six continents and presented at festivals including the BBC Proms, Venice Biennale and Gaudeamus and at venues such as New York's Carnegie Hall, London's Royal Albert Hall, Amsterdam's Concertgebouw and Tokyo's Suntory Hall. There are over 40 commercial recordings of his music available.

In 1998 he was elected to Aosdána, Ireland's national association of creative artists, and he has been AHRB Research Fellow at the University of Ulster and "An Foras

Feasa" post-Doctoral Research Fellow at Dundalk Institute of Technology as well as composer-in-association with California's Camerata Pacifica ensemble, the Ulster Orchestra and the Hard Rain SoloistEnsemble. He was director of the Sligo New Music Festival from 2003 to 2011.

Linda Buckley, composer

Linda Buckley is an Irish composer who creates electronic and acoustic music, often in the realm of glitch, drone and dark ambient. Her NMC record From Ocean's Floor was featured by Iggy Pop on BBC Radio 6 as "beautiful music – here is somebody really special". Her work has been described as "sublime and brilliant" (BBC Radio 3), "engaging with an area of experience that new music is generally shy of, which, simplified and reduced to a single word, I'd call ecstasy" (Bob Gilmore, Journal of Music).

She has written extensively for orchestra (BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra, National Symphony Orchestra of Ireland) and was elected to Áosdana in 2021. Recent collaborations include new work for Liam Byrne and Crash Ensemble, Gudrun Gut (Einstürzende Neubauten), Brìghde Chaimbeul and the Maxwell Quartet, film maker Mark Cousins (A Sudden Glimpse to Deeper Things) and the score to Nothing Compares (co-composed with Irene Buckley), the award-winning film based on Sinéad O'Connor.



Dierdre McKay, composer

From rural County Down, Deirdre's work has featured at London's Southbank, The Wigmore Hall, The Phillips Collection, Washington, Muziekgebouw, Amsterdam, Orléans Concours International, Gothenburg International Chamber Music Festival, The National Sawdust, Brooklyn, Symphony Space and Carnegie Hall, New York.

Recipient of a Director's Choice Award from Boston Metro Opera's International Composers' Competition and an Arts Council of Northern Ireland's Major Individual

Artist Award, Deirdre received a Paul Hamlyn Composer Award, London, in 2018. In 2023, Deirdre's work represented Ireland at the ISCM World New Music Days, Cape Town, South Africa.

Commissions and performances include works for Dublin International Piano Competition, Northern Ireland Opera, State Choir Latvija for Louth Contemporary

Music, BBC Singers, Chamber Choir Ireland, Irish Chamber Orchestra, Ulster Orchestra, Boston Firebird Ensemble, Vertavo, Vanbrugh and RTÉ Con Tempo string quartets, Access Contemporary Music Chicago, New Music Dublin, Sound Festival, Aberdeen, Fidelio Trio, Dutch violist Elisabeth Smalt, pianists Andrew Zolinksy and Antti Siirala, Chloë Hanslip & Danny Driver, Darragh Morgan & Mary Dullea, Dušica Mladenović & Ian Wilson, Clíona Doris, Concorde and the Crash Ensemble.

Collaborations have included new works with visual artist Jean Duncan and writer/

actor Richard Dormer. Her work has been incorporated into films featuring at the Venice, Dublin and Montreal International Film Festivals. Following a composition Masters and doctorate at the University of Manchester and Queen's University, Belfast, Deirdre studied privately with Kevin Volans.

Her music has been released on the Lorelt, Diatribe and RTÉ Lyric FM labels and broadcast by BBC Radio 3, RTÉ, Deutschlandradio Kultur and New York's WNYC and WQXR.
