





UMAKANT AND RAMAKANT GUNDECHA are India's leading exponent of the Dhrupad style of music among the younger generation and the most active performers of that style both within India and on the international concert circuit. Born in Ujjain in Central India they have received conventional university educations and also studied music intensively in the traditional master-student or pupil relationship – guru-shishya parampara – that is essential to a fully developed capacity for active concert performers.

Umakant and Ramakant Gundecha learned Dhrupad vocal under the renowned Dhrupad vocalist Ustad Zia Fariduddin Dagar and Ustad Zia Mohiuddin Dagar, the distinguished performer of the Rudra Vina, the oldest of Indian stringed instruments.

They have sung great Hindi poetry of Tulsidas, Keshav Das, Padmakar, Kabir and Nirala

in Dhrupad style. They are regularly featured on All India Radio and Doordarshan-TV. BBC and Radio France have relayed their concerts.

The Gundecha Brothers have composed music for several documentary films.

They have performed in all prestigious and major music festivals all over India and many important international music festivals and institutions such as Festival of India in Germany 1991/92; Indo-Norwegian Society Festival in Oslo 1992; Asian Arts Festival in Hongkong 1992; India International Music Festival in Bombay 1993; National Convention Spic Macay in Norfolk USA 1994; Festival of India, Detroit Institute of Arts 1994; Western Music Conservatory Winterthur, Switzerland 1994; Smithsonian Institute Washington 1995; The Walter Art Gallery Baltimore and House of World Cultures Berlin 1995.

The Gundecha Brothers have received various awards and Fellowships such as M. P. Government Scholarship 1981–85; National Fellowship 1987–94; Ustad Allaudin Khan Fellowship 1993–94; Sanskrit Award 1994; They have also been recorded by HMV, Music Today and Rhythm House in India.

AKHILESH GUNDECHA, younger brother to the vocalists, is a disciple of Pandit Shrikant Mishra and received special training in pakhawaj from the eminent practitioner of that instrument, Raja Chhatrapati Singh Judev. Akhilesh generally accompanies his brothers, but has performed with other musicians as well.

DHRUPAD is the most ancient style of Hindustani classical music which has survived until today in its original form. It is a form of devotional music which traces its origin to the ancient text Sama Veda. The Sama Veda was chanted with the help of melody and rhythm, called Samagana. Gradually this developed into other vocal styles called

Chhanda and Prabhabda with the introduction of verse and metre. The fusion of these two elements led to the emergence of Dhrupad. By the eleventh century, Dhrupad music had crystallized into a perfect form which has retained its original structure and purity till today.

Dhrupad owes its richness to a majestic and systematic unfolding of traditional Ragas.

It is primarily vocal music although it is also performed on the Rudra Veena. After a solo elaboration of the Raga, the vocalist sings a composed poetry and its improvised variations set to a specific rhythmic cycle. Accompaniment is provided by the Pakhawaj, a horizontal drum with a deep, vibrant sound. Originally sung in the temples, Dhrupad also gained royal patronage until the end of princely rule and India's independence in 1947. Since that time Dhrupad music has shifted to the concert stage, and has won the appreciation of enthusiastic audience in India and abroad.
