

Holiday Greetings from the Cincinnati Pops!

The holiday season is all about tradition and memory. For me the holidays conjure thoughts of Aunt Machie's bourbon fruit cake, the magic of winter's first snow, the smell of a hardwood fire in the hearth, and the gentle crackling of the *Goodyear* or *Firestone* LP on the hi-fi. An eclectic blend of familiar standards, these albums featured an exceptionally diverse collection of the era's most esteemed performers framed in brilliant orchestral arrangements echoing the angels' proclamations two millennia ago, "Peace on earth, goodwill to ALL people!"

As a kid these recordings seemed to be the ultimate representation of the rich panoply of the American musical experience and everyone in the Russell family savored each soulful, playful, groovy and crystalline note. Dad would pick up the annual installment when getting the snow tires mounted on our Plymouth Satellite; his arrival home with record in hand would herald the true beginning of the Christmas season. The newest album and its dozen or so counterparts from years past would play while we set up our tree, decorated cookies, entertained friends and neighbors, ripped open presents and sipped egg nog on New Year's Eve. These albums were the soundtracks to our holiday celebrations and are the essence of this recording we bring to you, featuring the beloved Cincinnati Pops Orchestra.

In my first recording with the Pops, *Home for the Holidays*, we bring together old favorites and many sensational new arrangements that celebrate the spirit of the season, and showcase the versatility and sheer virtuosity of the Pops. George Bizet's classic *Farandole* and Leon Jessel's *Parade of the Wooden Soldiers* in a wildly original arrangement by Morton Gould, are fantastic orchestral showpieces.

The warmth and intimacy of the orchestra is heard in Gounod's Ave Maria, played in a gorgeous setting by violinists Timothy Lees and Gabriel Pegis, and the delicate rhythmic lilt of Steven Amundson's Angel's Dance creates an enchanting variation on "Angels We Have Heard on High." There are tried-and-true arrangements such as Hershy Kay's Deck the Halls, as well as a brilliant new work, A Winter Miracle that cleverly combines Vivaldi's "Winter" from The Four Seasons with "Hanukkah O Hanukkah." The Liberaceinspired treatment of Leroy Anderson's Sleigh Ride, features Pops keyboardist Julie Spangler, both as soloist and arranger, and is an absolute delight.

The incredible New York Voices add a jazzy twist to two old time favorites, Jolly Old St. Nicholas and Santa Claus is Comin' to Town; Darmon Meader's vocal arrangement and scat solo are superb. Our version of O Holy Night, conceived as a tribute to the legendary tenor Mario Lanza, features vocal powerhouse Rodrick Dixon, who also takes the traditional spiritual Go Tell it on the Mountain on a gospel-infused joy ride.

What holiday album would be complete without an amazing chorus? From the traditional We Wish You a Merry Christmas to the 1954 holiday hit Home for the Holidays, the May Festival Chorus, led by director Robert Porco, was the perfect partner in this project. The Winton Woods High School Varsity Ensemble, with whom the Pops has worked on numerous occasions, adds youthful exuberance to the opening track. Deck the Halls, as well as I Believe, by William Schermerhorn and Wesley Whatley, which is destined to become a holiday classic.

"Nimrod" from Enigma Variations, by Edward Elgar, may seem out of place on a holiday disc, but becomes a perfect musical setting for the enduring words of Francis Pharcellus Church, who wrote the 1897 editorial in the New York Sun, Yes Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. Broadway superstar Brian Stokes Mitchell, with a little help from my daughter, Alma (as the 8 year-old Virginia O'Hanlon) express the child-like wonderment we all feel during the holiday season.

It has been a thrill to create this newest addition to the Cincinnati Pops catalogue. I hope it brings you the same inspiration and joy we all had bringing this recording to life.

From the Cincinnati Pops family to your family, we wish you a very merry Christmas, a wonderful holiday season and a glorious New Year!

JOHN MORRIS BUSSELL

Consistently winning international praise for his extraordinary music making and visionary leadership, John Morris Russell began his tenure as Conductor of the Cincinnati Pops Orchestra in September, 2011. Maestro Russell "has shown a new generation, the strength and versatility of symphonic pops" raves the Cincinnati Enquirer, as he continues to build upon the legacy of Pops founder and conductor Erich Kunzel.

Mr. Russell has worked with many of North America's most distinguished ensembles including the orchestras of Dallas, Detroit, Houston, Toronto, Vancouver as well as Miami's New World Symphony, Minnesota Orchestra, New York Philharmonic, Los Angeles Philharmonic, and The Cleveland Orchestra. In 1999 he replaced an ailing Maestro Kunzel at the famed Musikverein in Vienna, in a concert featuring the Harlem Boychoir, the Vienna Choir Boys and the actor Gregory Peck. The performance was recorded on CD, DVD, and continues to be televised throughout Europe, Japan and in the USA on PBS.

Widely considered one of North America's leaders in orchestral educational programming, Maestro Russell champions music making of all kinds in schools and communities throughout the USA and Canada. For 12 years he conducted "LinkUP!" concerts at Carnegie Hall, the oldest and most celebrated series of its kind, created by Walter Damrosch in 1891 and made famous by Leonard Bernstein. As Associate Conductor of the Cincinnati Symphony and Pops Orchestras (1995-2006), he created the "Classical Roots" series, celebrating the music of African-American composers, as well as the "Sound Discoveries" series which remains a leading model for educational concerts across the continent.

John Morris Russell also serves as Music Director of the Hilton Head Symphony Orchestra in South Carolina, and is Conductor Laureate of the Windsor Symphony Orchestra in Ontario, Canada, where he was Music Director between 2001 and 2012.

Mr. Russell studied at the University of Southern California, Williams College, the Cleveland Institute of Music, the Aspen Music Festival, the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London, and the Pierre Monteux School for Conductors in Hancock, Maine. Maestro Russell received an Honorary Doctorate from The University of Windsor in 2011.

CINCINNATI POPS ORCHESTRA

With millions of recordings sold, the Cincinnati Pops is one of the world's most admired ensembles. Founded in 1977 by the late conductor Erich Kunzel and part of the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra umbrella organization, the Pops tours nationally and internationally, most recently performing in Beijing as part of the Opening Festivities of the 2008 Summer Olympic Games. In 2005, the Pops completed an historic tour to China and Singapore performing in the Great Hall of the People in Beijing. The Cincinnati Pops was the first U.S. pops orchestra to perform in China, and also has appeared to enthusiastic audiences in New York's Carnegie Hall, in Washington D.C. and in Japan and Taiwan.

Following that first historic tour to China, a 2005 editorial in the *Cincinnati Enquirer* said the tour had "put an exclamation mark on our orchestra's phenomenal popularity in China, cultivated through its dozens of recordings. For residents of Greater Cincinnati, this success ought to underscore the fact that even among our region's wealth of cultural treasures, the Pops represents a unique resource that no other city can guite match."

The Pops is a vibrant part of Cincinnati and the surrounding region, presenting world-class concerts at historic Music Hall, the Orchestra's summer home at Riverbend Music Center, and in neighborhoods throughout the community. When Cincinnati was chosen to be the first North American city to host the World Choir Games, the Pops was selected as the official orchestra for this international event in 2012, performing at the Opening and Closing Ceremonies led by Conductor John Morris Russell.

The celebrated list of guest artists who have performed and collaborated with the Cincinnati Pops include Ella Fitzgerald, Frederica von Stade, Doc Severinsen, Henry Mancini, Chris Botti, Mel Tormé, Duke Ellington, Cab Calloway, Kristin Chenoweth, Jennifer Holliday, Bernadette Peters, Vanessa Williams, Dave Brubeck, The Temptations, John Williams, Idina Menzel, Rosemary Clooney, Michael Feinstein and the Mormon Tabernacle Choir.

An estimated 30 million people have viewed eight national telecasts of the Cincinnati Pops on PBS, and the Orchestra has more than 100 available recordings, 55 of which have appeared on the *Billboard* charts, a record unmatched by any other orchestra. The Pops' *Copland: Music of America* won a Grammy in 1997, and four other Pops recordings have been nominated for Grammy Awards.
