CONDUCTOR'S NOTE

"The heavens opened and a blinding light of exceptional brilliance flowed through my entire brain. And so it kindled my whole heart and breast like a flame...."

Hildegard von Bingen (1098–1179) (referring to her visions in the preface to Scivias, completed c. 1151)

Hildegard's concept of light in spirituality was an inspiration for this collection of works. She emerged from her difficult youth a brilliant and guiding presence to many people of her time and to succeeding generations in the eight centuries since her death. This recording includes a portion of Hildegard's *Ordo Virtutum*, a chant-based play depicting the journey of the human soul.

The Latin word *Lumina* means to illuminate, shine, brighten, or reveal. Each of the works on this recording speaks to the presence of light throughout our life journey: from birth to death, through love, disappointment, forgiveness, and transcendence. These pieces are drawn primarily from Renaissance and Baroque composers of England and Germany, with the inclusion of two special 19th-century works by composers who were deeply inspired by the ideas and musical styles of these earlier time periods. Westminster Kantorei and I hope that this sonic journey will inspire a deeper presence of light in your life.

CONDUCTOR AND CHOIR PROFILES

AMANDA QUIST is associate professor and department chair of Conducting, Organ, and Sacred Music at Westminster Choir College, where she conducts the Westminster Chapel Choir and Westminster Kantorei, and she teaches graduate and undergraduate conducting. She has also worked with the Westminster Symphonic Choir and collaborated with the New York Philharmonic, The Philadelphia Orchestra, Dresden Staatskapelle and composers Ola Gjeilo and Tarik O'Regan. Dr. Quist served as chorus master for the premiere of Toshio Hosokawa's opera Matsukaze at the Spoleto Festival USA and the Lincoln Center Festival. The New York Times and Charleston City Paper praised the chorus' performance as "beautifully prepared, gripping," a "gossamer web of voices" and "bridging the vocal and instrumental textures with perfect intonation." She also served as chorus master for the Philadelphia Symphonic Choir's performance of Mahler's Symphony No. 3 with The Philadelphia Orchestra. Dr. Quist is director of the Westminster Vocal Institute, a highly regarded summer program for talented high school students, and she was previously director of choral activities at San José State University. Her honors include the James Mulholland National Choral Award, the Audrey Davidson Early Music Award and Rider University's 2014 Distinguished Teaching Award. Her research focus is voice science and pedagogy in choral singing, and she has presented an interest session for the National American Choral Directors Association (ACDA) Conference titled "Building Sound and Spirit." She has guest conducted honor choirs and served as adjudicator/clinician across the United States and in Europe. A mezzo-soprano, Dr. Quist has performed professionally with the St. Ignatius of Antioch choir and choir of St. Mary the Virgin Times Square in Manhattan, Fuma Sacra, Princeton Pro Musica, Princeton University, Monmouth Civic Chorus, Symphony Silicon Valley and others. She serves as the National ACDA Repertoire & Resources Coordinator for Collegiate Activities.

Composed of students at Westminster Choir College, WESTMINSTER KANTOREI is an auditioned chamber choir specializing in early and contemporary music. The ensemble performs regularly with some of America's leading specialists in Baroque music. It was a national finalist for The American Prize, whose judges stated that Kantorei is "truly outstanding," and described the choir as having a "finely-measured and delicate balance of voices, and a mastery of stylistic performance practice." Westminster Kantorei's engagements include concerts in Princeton and performances at the Boston Early Music Festival, the American Handel Festival and the American Choral Directors Association Eastern Division Conference. Recent seasons have included performing as the featured guest ensemble for the Reformation 500 Anniversary Concert in the Princeton University Chapel and performances of Bach's St. Matthew Passion, with the Westminster Choir and the New York Philharmonic, conducted by Kurt Masur. Additionally, it has toured England and France, where it performed at the Festival Musique en L'ile in Paris.

Westminster Kantorei has premiered works by contemporary composers, including Caleb Burhans, Daniel Elder, Doug Helvering, Blake Hensen, Philip Rice and the internationally acclaimed Swedish composer Sven-David Sandström, whose God Be Merciful was commissioned for the ensemble by the Soli Deo Gloria Foundation and the Westminster Choir College Department of Sacred Music as part of the Psalms Project. Westminster Kantorei, joined by Fuma Sacra and the Institute Festival Orchestra, can be heard on the Albany recording Jon Magnussen: Music for Limon Dances.
